## The Year of St Joseph – A Reflection.



Today we mark the Ascension of the Lord and also World Communications Day. Pope Francis has chosen to reflect on the theme "Come and See" (Jn 1:46). Communicating by Encountering People Where and as They Are." This theme recalls the Gospel account of the first disciples' initial encounters with Jesus, who invited them to "Come and see," to enter into relationship with Him. In his message for World Communications Day, Pope Francis says Jesus' invitation to "Come and see" is the way by which the Christian faith is communicated. That is how Christian faith begins, and how it is communicated: as direct knowledge, born of experience, and not of hearsay. Pope Francis explains that seeing something for oneself is the best way of getting at the truth of things, and "the most honest test of every message, because, in order to know, we need to encounter, to let the person in front of me speak, to let his or her testimony reach me."

## Pope Francis establishes formal Ministry of Catechesis

"The Spirit is calling men and women to set out and encounter all those who are waiting to discover the beauty, goodness and truth of the Christian faith," Pope Francis wrote in Antiquum Ministerium ("Ancient Ministry"), his document released at on May 11th 2021.
