Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time, Cycle C

Background on the Gospel Reading

This Sunday we read from the Gospel of Luke, continuing immediately from last week's Gospel. Recall that in last Sunday's Gospel, Jesus read from the prophet Isaiah and announced that this Scripture was now fulfilled. In today's Gospel, we learn that the people of Nazareth are impressed by Jesus' words, and yet they seem surprised. They still think of Jesus as merely Joseph's son. They do not expect such words from someone they believe that they know. This Gospel is about who Jesus is and who people believe him to be. The story of Jesus' preaching and rejection at Nazareth is found in each of the Synoptic Gospels. In Luke's Gospel, this incident is told in a way that foretells Jesus' passion and death and helps explain the inclusion of the Gentiles in the promise of salvation.

1 February 2022
Feast of St Brigid,
Abbess and Secondary
Patron of Ireland.

St. Brigid, also known as "Mary of the Gael", was an Abbess and Patroness of Ireland. Founder of a monastery in County Kildare, that became a source of inspiration to many more throughout Europe. Born in Dundalk in 450 AD, St Brigid is accredited with first creating the unique cross which bears her name. This cross is normally hand created from rushes however occasionally straw is also used. The distinctive St. Brigid's Cross is thought to keep evil, fire and hunger from the homes in which it is displayed. The saint shares her name with a Celtic goddess. She is patroness of many things, including poetry, learning, healing, protection, blacksmithing, livestock and dairy production. Brigid's feast day on February 1st, was originally a festival called Imbolc, marking the beginning of Spring. From 2023 it will be a public holiday in the Republic of Ireland, the first named after a woman.

Feast of The Presentation of
the Lord & World Day for
Consecrated Life.



February 2nd is the feast of the Presentation of the Lord Jesus in the Temple. It commemorates Simeon's famous prophecy that Jesus would be a "light of revelation to the Gentiles." It is also known as Candlemas since it is the day that candles are blessed for use throughout the Church year. Candles bought in Parish Office will be blessed in time for the procession at Mass. Jesus in time will also echo the words of Simeon and boldly proclaim.

"I am the light of the world" (John 8:12).

February 2 is also World Day for Consecrated Life. An opportunity to recognise the contributions that Consecrated Men and Women make to the Church and Society at large. It was instituted by St Pope John Paul II in 1997. World Day for Consecrated Life is a Day of Prayer for Women and Men in Consecrated Life.

3 February Memorial of St Blaise Blessing of Throats at 10am Morning Mass

St Blaise, a fourth century bishop at Sebaste (now the city of Sivas in central Turkey, in what was then the Roman province of Armenia-Cappadocia). During a persecution – probably ordered by Constantine's ally and co-emperor Licinius – he was martyred in 316 AD. People often turned to Saint Blaise for healing miracles. In 316, the governor of Cappadocia of Agricola, arrested then-bishop Blaise for being a Christian. On the way to the jail, a woman presented her only son, who was choking to death on a fish bone, at his feet. Blaise cured the child, and though Agricola was amazed, he could not get Blaise to renounce his faith. So he met his death in Martyrdom.
